The teacher will tab/highlight the important information to assist some learners with answering questions.

Lesson Sequence/Procedures

Estimated	Detailed Description of Teaching and Learning
Time Needed	
Day 1	 The teacher will read <i>We Shall Overcome</i> by Brian Collier to introduce the Civil Rights Movement. The teacher will lead a discussion about the book and then tell the objective for the week. Mini-lesson on research. (review) The students will go to their first station to collect information.
Day 2	Students will visit three stations and collect information about their topics.
Day 3	 Students will visit the last two stations and collect information about their topics. Students will begin working on their timeline.
Day 4	Students will work with their group to write all the information they have collected on their timelines.
Day 5	 Students will find correlating images (from LOC) to paste on their timelines.
Assessments:	What are the evaluation (informal and formal) tasks for this lesson? How do the evaluation tasks connect with the learning objectives? How do the evaluation tasks demonstrate student learning? How will students receive feedback? The students will create a timeline of the important events of the Civil Rights Movement. This timeline will include events in the lives of Civil Rights leaders Rosa Parks, Ruby Bridges, Thurgood Marshall, and Martin Luther King, Jr. Students will document their sources. The teacher will provide feedback through a rubric looking for accuracy with events, dates, and pictures of the Civil Rights Movement.
