Lesson Sequence/Procedures		
Estimated Time Needed	Detailed Description of Teaching and Learning	
10 minutes	Teacher will read the book "Sing a Song" to the students in the classroom. The teacher will ask the students who, what, where when or why questions to check for understanding while doing the read aloud.	
5 minutes	Students will have a conversation with a partner discussing different things that happened in the story. Students will be able to share their thoughts from their discussion with the whole group.	
30 minutes	Teacher and students will identify the historical eras and major events illustrated in the book. The teacher will show the Memphis Tennesse photos and ask students to compare the two different photos. Ask students to consider segregation from multiple perspectives. How would they react if they were excluded? How would they feel if they were not excluded? What would they do if they were asked to enforce the rule or law? Teacher and students will create a chart and students will list details from pictures and use the primary and secondary sources to make connections.	

Assessments:	The teacher will have students complete an exit ticket asking the students about different historical events that took place in the story. This assessment will allow the teacher to see if the students were able to identify the different events that took place in the store and to see if they comprehend the events that happened in the story. The students will receive feedback on their assessment by getting their exit
